If your affiliate votes to reject, please comment on any points of contention so they may be reconsidered. Approval will require a simple majority of votes cast. The deadline for receipt of votes is September 15, 2024. Voting results will be announced in the Autumn 2024 issue of Northern Lights."

The steering committee seeks a volunteer to serve as webmaster for the NCRAL 2025 convention. - ALCON 2025 ANNOUNCEMENT: "The 2025 Astronomical League convention will be held June 25 28, 2025, at Bryce Canyon, Utah. The committee has been working hard to plan a convention that will be "ASTRONOMICAL"!! They hope to have the 2025 website up and running soon. - T Coronae Borealis (T CrB) is known as the "Blaze Star" for its specular thermonuclear outbursts that tend to occur about every 78 years. T CrB is a binary star system consisting of a red giant star and a white dwarf. The white dwarf, like a vampire, cannibalizes gas from its companion, and over time, the white dwarf accumulates hydrogen gas from the red giant. When the amount of gas reaches a critical amount, a stupendous thermonuclear reaction occurs on the surface of the white dwarf. The resulting explosion causes the system's brightness to increase by a factor of 1,600 (8 magnitudes). There is an A.L. observing

- Since 2002, the Sangamon Astronomical Society has hosted the Illinois Dark Skies Star Party at Jim Edgar Panther Creek State Fish and Wildlife Area, Illinois' largest recreational site. You are invited to join SAS for the 2024 edition of the IDSSP, Oct. 3-5. It's an observer-oriented event at a great facility offering acres of land for observing. You can camp right at your observing site. However, an extensive camping facility is adjacent to the event site, including onsite electricity, water, sewer for campers, and self-contained R.V.s. Special astronomy talks are planned with accredited presenters. The IDSSP also has quality food services, or you can bring your food. For details and registration, <u>www.sas-sky.org</u>.
- 2024 Iowa Star Party! Some of the darkest skies in Iowa will again be the home for this year's Iowa Star Party from Thursday, October 3 through Sunday, October 6. The party will be in the picturesque Whiterock Conservancy near Coon Rapids. The Conservancy is a 5,500-acre land trust with over 40 miles of trails for walkers, hikers, runners, mountain bikers, equestrians, and paddlers. In addition to trails, Whiterock offers accommodations, camping, fishing, stargazing, and many other outdoor activities. The Conservancy has carved out a large star field with plenty of room for nearby parking and dark star gazing. The program is hosted by the Ames Area Amateur Astronomers and co-sponsored by the Des Moines Astronomical Society. The Conservancy is slightly over an hour west of Des Moines and Ames. Accommodations include tent camping, R.V. campsites, lodging rooms at the Oakridge Guesthouse, and two nearby motels. For paid registrants, a banquet and guest speaker will be held on Saturday evening before stargazing. The public is invited (free) to the star field on Saturday evening for stargazing and interactions with amateur astronomers and their many telescopes. - Through the vision of the Horkheimer Charitable Fund, the Astronomical League offers a free Library Telescope to a lucky Astronomical League club in each of the ten A.L. regions and to a Member-at-Large. This year, at ALCon 2024, the Twin City Amateur Astronomers were designated to receive this year's Library Telescope Program telescope. The telescope, a 4.5" aperture reflector valued at about \$200, and 8-24mm Zoom eyepiece, valued at \$100, will go to the Vespasian Warner Public Library in Clinton, Illinois.
- ★ On June 13, 2024, the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh administration made an unexpected announcement: the closure of the UWO Fox Cities campus, slated for June 2025. This campus is home to the Barlow Planetarium, the Weis Earth Science Museum, and the Communication Arts Center—three vital entities notably absent from the University's announcement and whose futures now hang in the balance. This decision, made without public input, threatens to dismantle key educational and cultural institutions that have been cornerstones of inspiration in the Fox Cities for decades. The future of the planetarium, museum, and arts center is known. The Northeast Wisconsin Stargazers (NEWSTAR) Board of Directors has gone on public record opposing the possible closure of these facilities. - Next Regional Convention: An NCRAL steering committee will manage the regional convention next year because we do not have an affiliate willing to host until 2026. The committee has been meeting bimonthly throughout this summer to organize initial plans. This group wants to recruit new members into the amateur astronomy community and highlight new ideas and discoveries. Accordingly, the conference theme will be *First Light: New Frontiers, New People*, and half a dozen speakers have already been recruited. The conference location will be in the Minneapolis/St. Paul area. The exact site has yet to be determined. The committee welcomes John Martin from The Rochester Astronomy Club as conference webmaster and technical expert.
