NCRAL 2025 was a success on April 25-26 in the Minneapolis metropolitan area. This was the first convention hosted by NCRAL itself, lacking as it did a host. Nonetheless, the Rochester Astronomy Club did most of the work of pulling the convention together, with the Minnesota Astronomical Society hosting the observing session at their Eagle Lake Observatory. Individual members of Cedar Amateur Astronomers, Milwaukee Astronomical Society, Naperville Astronomical Association, and Popular Astronomy Club also assisted. More than 70 individuals,



including speakers, spouses, and unregistered volunteers, were present for the convention. Details about the annual gathering will appear in the Summer issue of the *Northern Lights* newsletter. The NCRAL annual business meeting was held on the morning of April 26 in Minnetonka, MN, just outside Minneapolis. The meeting began with Chair Alan Sheidler providing an Annual Report. He spoke about outreach, observing awards, and various regional publications. He also gave an update on library telescopes in the Region and the size of the Regional Membership. He then broke down attendee distribution, with Rochester Astronomy Club, Minnesota Astronomical Society, and Popular Astronomy Club making up about half of all attendees. Al then gave details about the Region's publications, *Northern Lights,* and *NCRAL blotter.* A proposal for the NCRAL 2026 conference was given by Tom Weber, president of Cedar Amateur Astronomers. Their theme is "Mission Possible." After viewing a short video showing highlights of what they are planning, a vote was taken, and unanimous approval was given to proceed with their proposal. The tentative date for NCRAL 2026 is May 15-17. There were no volunteers for 2027 or future conferences. We also had elections for Chair, Vice-Chair, and Regional Rep. Al Sheidler was re-elected to Chair, and John Attewell was re-elected to Regional Representative. Eric Claeys from Naperville Astronomical Association was elected Vice-Chair, replacing William Davidson, who had to step down due to term limits.

- The Region has two new award winners! Bob King, of the Minnesota Astronomical Society and the Arrowhead Astronomical Society (Duluth), was recognized with the 2025 Region Award, and James VandeBerg, of the Des Moines Astronomical Society, was recognized with the NCRAL Newsletter Editor Award for publishing *Starlight Journal*. Details will be provided in the Summer issue of *Northern Lights*. Congratulations to our recipients!
- Astrophotography awards were also given at this year's conference, which had many fine examples of astronomically themed images. Gerry Kocken (Neville Public Museum Astronomical Society), Craig Cox (Quad Cities Astronomical Society), Matt Ryno (Milwaukee Astronomical Society), Mark Weber (Northern Cross Science Foundation), Scott Roffers (Northeast Wisconsin Stargazers), and Lee Keith (Milwaukee Astronomical Society). All were winners in various categories in the astrophotography contest. Scott Roffers and Lee Keith were both best-in-show winners. Congratulations!

- The TCAA's Guidebook web page was updated recently, thanks to a Cedar Amateur Astronomers member who noticed several links were broken and reported them. These broken links have been repaired.
